### Stewart Co. call for Paris Landing Inn delay

DOVER, Tenn. — The Stewart County Commission is solidly in favor of delaying the plan to raze the 130-room inn at Paris Landing State Park and replace it with a 60-room resort-style facility.

After County Mayor Rick Joiner read a letter from Dist. 75 state Rep. Tim Wargau, expressing his concern about the legislative body going on the record in opposition to the plan, a motion was made to approve a resolution to delay the project, and without discussion, it passed unanimously.

"I think the commissioners took the right vote and expressed the wishes of the citizen taxpayers," David Ross, who has spearheaded the delay effort, said after the Monday commission meeting adjourned.

The Dover Board of Mayor and Aldermen passed a similar resolution on Feb. 12.

Ross urged both Dover and Stewart County leaders to ask the state to delay the project until the next governor has an opportunity to review the plans.

Because Stewart County relies heavily on tourism dollars, and because many county residents are employed at the state park across Kentucky Lake in Henry County, Ross and others are concerned about the economic impact from the demolition and construction process.

### Wirgau's case

In his letter, which Joiner said arrived late Monday afternoon, Wirgau apologized for not being able to attend the meeting and assured commissioners he was doing all he could to have a "happy ending" at the completion of the project. He conceded, however, it is nearly impossible to make everyone happy, but he vowed to "continue to work on this situation as it moves forward and will attempt to answer every phone call or visit with those who wish to have discussions with me on this project."

Wirgau, whose district includes Stewart and Henry counties, said in the letter he is working on some options like a temporary restaurant and temporary cabins, as well as money for both counties to help off-set lost revenues while the project is under way.

In a previous interview, he said he was trying to get money set aside in next year's budget to locate a restaurant in the separate, on-site convention center for the duration of the project.

"Any opposition to the project may hinder these options from happening," he said in the letter.

In closing, Wirgau asked commissioners to think about the implications "before passing any resolution that would do more harm to our efforts than help."

#### Counter points

Prior to the meeting, Ross passed out information to commissioners, which referred to a 2013 Business and Management Plan that calls for a \$7.8 million renovation of the existing inn.

"This is like a visionary plan for all of the state parks," Ross said after the meeting. "And in it, it talks about the need to upgrade various aspects of the park, not just the inn."

Indeed, the plan notes upgrades are needed for the golf course, marina, cabins, pool, boat ramps, restrooms, beach area, playground and picnic areas.

Ross added that the plan does not mention demolishing the current inn and building back a smaller hotel.

"If the \$26 million we got allocated is used for a tear-down and a rebuild, that's just going to be doing part of what the governor's own plan is saying," he said. "So, the most logical course of action is to follow the governor's plan, which makes a lot of economic sense.

"Renovate the current inn as recommended, and then spend the rest of the \$26 million on upgrades."

The Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation, which oversees the state park system, indicates the Business Management Plan was updated in 2015.

"It was followed by an independent study in the same year that included a thorough market analysis, repositioning and conceptual vision," Kim Schofinski, TDEC deputy communications director, said in a Feb. 16 email. "The findings determined that the cost of simply renovating the Inn would not meet current hospitality standards or the expectations of our visitors and provided the rationale for a rebuild.

"This project is a critical long-term investment that will result in increased sales tax revenue, an increased occupancy rate at the park, and an overall better visitor experience. Ultimately it will better serve park visitors, the local community and Tennessee taxpayers."

### **Stewart County Commissioners:**

ALL of the \$26 million allocated by the state for Paris Landing State Park needs to be spent on ALL of the state park, not just the inn. With a \$26 million investment in renovating the current inn and upgrading all of our state park, Paris Landing will once again be the "crown jewel" of the Tennessee State Park system. Stewart County will reap the rewards of this investment.

The \$26 million should be spent to renovate and upgrade the existing 130-room and multiple meeting room convention and event-sized inn, restaurant and conference center. Then the remainder of the \$26 million SHOULD be spent to upgrade and enhance ALL of Paris Landing State Park.

The State of Tennessee has allocated \$26 million for Paris Landing State Park. Recommendations in the Tennessee State Parks Business and Management Plan, March 2013 for Paris Landing State Park Inn calls for a \$7.8 million RENOVATION of the existing inn. The plan, from Gov. Haslam's Department of Environment and Conservation says, "Replacing the HVAC is estimated at \$1.8 million and a significant RENOVATION for this facility is estimated at nearly \$6 million. We believe a major investment would increase occupancy, room rates and WILL produce a SIGNIFICANT INCREASE in revenue." (p. 31) The 2013 state plan NEVER mentions demolishing the current inn and downsizing facilities. The 2013 state plan does not mention privatization of Paris Landing State Park. The governor's plan makes sound economic sense and should be followed.

The state's 2013 Business and Management Plan discusses ALL of Paris Landing State Park in depth. It goes into great detail about the need to upgrade and renovate other areas of the park, including golf course, marina, cabins, pools, boat ramps, bathrooms, beach area, playground and picnic areas, etc.

State officials are saying if the \$26 million is not spent to demolish the current inn, that money will be lost. Citizens and taxpayers want the current inn renovated and the remainder of the \$26 million spent on the entire park. By the time the demolition project is finished, change orders made, asbestos abatement completed, continuous landfill storage paid for the refuse of the current inn, the price will be well in excess of \$26 million. We may NEVER have an inn/restaurant rebuild at Paris Landing State Park.

Tourism is a vital part of Stewart County's economy. Paris Landing State Park and its convention and event-sized inn play a huge role in the tourism industry of Stewart County, the southern home of Land Between the Lakes, Fort Donelson National Battlefield, Cross Creeks National Wildlife Refuge, Kentucky Lake/Lake Barkley, our part of Fort Campbell, Stewart State Forest. A \$26 million investment in the entire Paris Landing State Park will pay huge economic dividends to Stewart County and our area.

I have copies of many pages of signed petitions from taxpayers and citizens who want the current Paris Landing State Park inn saved.

BUSINESS AND MANAGEMENT PLAN MARCH 2013

### Near Term - Within One to Three Years

**Civilian Conservation Corps Cabins** - The CCC-constructed buildings (circa 1930s) are iconic cultural and historical elements of State Parks throughout America. The arts and crafts elements of the cabin design and construction are very appealing to the tourist desiring an authentic travel experience. These cabins are located at Norris Dam, Cumberland Mountain, Pickett, Chickasaw, Natchez Trace, and Big Ridge. The funding for renovating the CCC Cabins at Norris Dam were included in the Governor's FY13-14 budget. Renovation of the CCC cabins to their original status with modern conveniences included, but not obtrusive to the sense of place and time will result in significant ability to increase rates. Situated near the Museum of the Appalachia in nearby Norris, this cabin array will be marketed at a holistic experience with other area attractions.

Paris Landing Inn and Conference Center - Located on Kentucky Lake, this facility is both tired and worn. It has an HVAC system that is near the end of its life with components are more than 40 years old and where repair parts no longer exist. Replacing the HVAC is estimated at \$1.8M, and a significant renovation for the facility is estimated at nearly \$6M. We believe a major investment would increase occupancy, room rates, and will produce a significant increase in revenue.

Henry Horton Inn and Conference Center and Natchez Trace Inn and Conference Center - These facilities are placed in locations with attractive, yet insignificant scenery. Both are local or regional in their appeal. Both are tired and worn. Both have experienced significant operating losses over the past few years. Despite recreational lakes at Natchez Trace and Henry Horton's location on the Duck River with golf course and shooting range, neither park has been able maintain adequate utilization of their inns. We recommend seeking a private operator for each, or if not successful, explore demolition of the facilities. Annual savings are approximately \$700,000 per year (Attachment K).

Swimming Pools - State Parks operates 27 swimming pools: seven located at inn and conference centers for guests' exclusive use and 20 for public admission. These public pools are available to campground guests at a reduced fee. An analysis of the 20 public pool operations indicates that overall they generated approximately \$50,000 more than they cost in FY11-12. However, several operate at significant deficits. These include Booker T. Washington, Standing Stone, and Indian Mountain. Many others will need significant investments in a few years due to age and their general condition. These pools are typically open for the summer months only with busiest times from Memorial Day to mid-August. Mid-August school starting dates impact both revenue and staff availability. Some pools have weekend hours from mid-August through Labor Day weekend.

We propose to close highly unprofitable pool operations not located at inns. Other pools should be considered for closure as they deteriorate, as opposed to renovations. Potential savings associated with selected pool closures at this time are approximately \$200,000 per year.

Dear Mayor Durrett and County Commissioners,

Attached are the email addresses of very important groups and individuals who can help us achieve the changes we desperately need to lower euthanasia rates and prevent overcapacity shelters by better educating the public.

This includes new persons who are interested including Ms. Alex Walker who is a Bloomberg Philanthropy On Site Project Manager in the Nashville Mayor's office. We spoke on Thursday and she is reaching out to Bloomberg Philanthropy and the Mayor's office. (The email list is on page 6)

I believe animal welfare should be declared as a State of Emergency or a Crisis because there is so much pain and suffering and death of animals. I'm certain that our communication to the public is lacking in urgency and frequency, and lacking in content, and this must change!

The effect on humans who work and volunteer in rescue is also devastating and can be harmful to our bodies and minds and deadly too because of the compassion fatigue that is documented by Maddies Fund University.

I'm aware of many people who suffer because of the heart break they see. Volunteer Tracie Hogan mentioned this in her speech to you in August!

We also need religious and community leaders and news media to increase messages about the overcapacity shelters and the high euthanasia rates. We need this to be very important in the priorities of elected officials.

We need all of the competing pet stores and pet food companies to help and Maddies Fund could be a great leader in this because their founders made 10 billion selling a computer software and they do not have any competitors. As seen in the booklet I gave you in March Maddies Fund is one of the groups that says we need a culture shift.

I've given you quotes with many calling for a "culture shift" to change this, but no changes are occurring.

Here's part of the reason why! Maddies Fund wrote "In the animal sheltering world, it's easy to fall into old and familiar ways of doing things."

That's exactly what's happening now!

The main thing we hear in the media is the ancient message of "everybody spay and neuter" and an occasional news story and occasional advertisement.

I've never heard them mention the reason it's so important to spay and neuter is because so many shelters in the U.S. are overcapacity and euthanasia rates are very high because of that.

1.5 million cats and dogs are euthanized every year in the U.S. according to the ASPCA

Maddies also wrote: "Are you limiting your appeal to a small group of dedicated rescuers who probably already have as many pets as they can have?"

The answer is yes!!!!

One of the main things we need that will not cost a penny is for government officials to have press releases that tell people why there is such a desperate need for people to spay and neuter! The free kittens and puppies that are being bred endlessly compete with the kittens and puppies that the shelters are trying to find homes for! That is part of the reason why the shelters are so overwhelmed.

Christian counties AC Director told me they have to euthanize many kittens and I'm sure there are many more counties that do the same.

Another very important topic is lost and found pets because there is a huge lack of education regarding what to do and how to prevent this. Many lost pets never get back home because of the lack of education.

Lost and Found Pets of Clarksville Tennessee has 15,000 members and their volunteers do a tremendous job of helping people find their lost dogs and cats, but many people don't know about them and they don't know what to do when they lose or find a pet.

The dedicated and loving volunteer administrators of that page support what I've submitted to you. There are more wonderful lost and found pages in our area and nationwide!

There are so many awesome volunteers who help save animals lives so I can't mention them all. I know that you all know Charlsie Hand and all that she and her family have done in philanthropy for Clarksville. Charlsie and

her friends help save many lives by spending many hours using social media to find homes for them. Charlsie supports what I've submitted to you, which is a work in progress.

Maddies Fund University wrote that people who help animals can be at high risk of depression, anxiety, physical illness and even suicide."

Many rescuers here use Facebook to find homes for dogs and cats and they often write about the heart break they have every day!

The booklet I gave you with all this is also seen on my facebook page titled Save Millions of Lives.

You'll see quotes from Nashville's Shelter Director who is willing to help.

As mentioned I have more persons interested including Ms. Alex Walker who is a Bloomberg Philanthropy On Site Project Manager in the Nashville Mayor's office. We spoke on Thursday and she is reaching out to Bloomberg Philanthropy and the Mayor's office.

Focus on Cumberland County Animal Shelter (FOCCAS) is one of the groups who are very interested in helping. They raised \$330,000 dollars to build a new shelter in Cumberland County,

JC Hancock is one of their members who liked my Save Millions of Lives page. JC served seven years in the Army, he served as Chairman of Cumberland Counties Board of Education, he has been with the Crossville police department for 20 years where he is Detective Sargent who leads a team that conducts all major criminal investigations.

He is a candidate for Cumberland County Mayor who is including his "Prioritize Animal Welfare (PAW) Plan as part of his goals.

JC Hancock said his plan "will pursue the development of an educational program for Elementary and Middle School age children that promotes a healthy awareness and consideration for pets and animals in general."

### Mr. Hancock also said:

(A) They will create "a meaningful curriculum that will promote good, positive change in the way our children discern humane from inhumane treatment of animals and promote a healthy attitude toward them."

(B) "Promote our strides in Prioritizing Animal Welfare to our state and federal leaders who make the laws."

The founders of FOCCAS are Jan Shaw-Hendrixson who is an Oncology nurse and her husband Dr. Mark Hendirxson who is a leading Oncologist in their area. They are very supportive of the information I've given you!

I only have about 78 likes on the Facebook page, but they represent groups from around the nation, and I have very little time for Facebook because I'm desperately trying to keep the feral colony that I help alive and rescue kittens before they die, plus I'm dyslexic form eye cancer surgery and have many problems with my vision.

I try to be desperate with dignity, but the cats I try to help are in a desperate situation! Every time I've spoken before the Commission I've been flying by the seat of my pants while setting on the edge of out of control which is what many people in rescue do everyday.

There are many topics that need to be included in animal welfare lessons and many groups in Middle Tennessee and nationwide that can provide guidance in this. On the Cumberland County Groups Facebook page I recently learned about the tremendous suffering that can be caused by leaving dogs chained.

Getting animal welfare included in public school lessons is one great way to create a huge impact and success.

Thousands of nonprofits and businesses are working to help animals. There are so many volunteers it's hard to even guess how many! Please realize the tremendous power we'll have when we join together to get animal welfare lessons in public schools!

We have got to do more and think out of the box and come up with new ways to cause many more lives to be saved. When I represented Disney Movies I won an award that was created especially for me regarding my ability to quickly analyze, create and problem solve before the problem occurred. I can provide more examples of national business accomplishments including being National Field Manager on the LEGO Toy Merchandising Project. I'm only telling you this because I'm asking you to do new very large things, and I've experienced it's often hard to achieve change unless you have a large group supporting you.

Last month I mentioned we have and need people of every ethnicity and every belief and non believers to help us save animals lives. I'm handicapped visually from internal eye cancer and I have falls and near falls and God is my hope for eternity, and I believe God is very relevant in everything and especially here, because Chaplain Creek prays wonderful prayers before every formal Commission meeting, and I've seen Mayor Durrett and our Commissioners express their love for God!

Philippians 4:13 in The Holy Bible says "I can do all things through Crist who strengthens me." Dear Lord what I want to do is be sure all of our elected officials and influential community leaders including Pastors realize the magnitude of suffering and death of animals in the U.S., and the devastating effect this also has on the humans who have so much love for the animals that they see suffer and die. I hope and pray that you will help them do new things, and if necessary step out of the comfort zone, because you want us to be successful and in the end zone, celebrating what we have accomplished for you.

# MILITARY INTERSTATE CHILDREN'S COMPACT

- The Council of State Governments (CSG), in cooperation with the US Department of Defense, drafted this Interstate Compact to address some of the educational challenges transitioning children of military families face. Since July 2006, CSG worked with a variety of federal, state and local officials as well as national stakeholder organizations representing education groups and military families to create the new interstate agreement.
- While the Compact is not exhaustive in its coverage, it does address the key issues encountered by military families: eligibility, enrollment, placement and graduation. In addition, the Compact provides for a detailed governance structure at both the state and national levels with built-in enforcement and compliance mechanisms.

# MILITARY INTERSTATE CHILDREN'S COMPACT

- The Tennessee Legislature enacted the Interstate Compact by placing it in our state's statutes in 2010.
  - Tenn. Code Ann. § 49-12-301
  - All 50 States and Washington DC are members of the Military Interstate Children's Compact.
- The goal of the Compact is to replace the widely varying policies affecting transitioning military students. The Compact leverages consistency: It uses a comprehensive approach that provides a consistent policy in every school district and in every state.

# MILITARY INTERSTATE CHILDREN'S COMPACT

- The Compact addresses key educational transition issues encountered by military families including enrollment, placement, attendance, eligibility and graduation.
- Children of active duty members of the uniformed services, National Guard and Reserve on active duty orders, commissioned officers of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) and the Unites States Public Health Service (USPHS), and members or veterans who are medically discharged or retired for one year are eligible for assistance under the Compact.

### **OUR MISSION**

Through the Interstate Compact, MIC3 addresses key educational transition issues encountered by children of military families.

### **OUR VALUES**

RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENT OF MONTGOMERY COUNTY TO REIMBURSE ITSELF FOR CERTAIN EXPENDITURES RELATING TO THE COMPLETION OF CIVITAN PARK PHASE II AT 650 BELLAMY LANE WITH THE PROCEEDS OF BONDS OR OTHER DEBT OBLIGATIONS TO BE ISSUED BY MONTGOMERY COUNTY, TENNESSEE IN AN APPROXIMATE AMOUNT OF \$2,200,000

**WHEREAS,** additional funding is needed to award the bid for construction of Civitan Park Phase II located at 650 Bellamy Lane, to include costs associated with new construction; and

WHEREAS, the project includes the construction of three (3) baseball/softball fields, Rotary Field of Dreams, multi-purpose field, playground, walking trail, restrooms, concession stands, pavilion and maintenance building, along with all associated site improvements including site utilities, walkways, paved parking areas, and ballpark amenities; and

**WHEREAS,** it is the intention of the Board of County Commissioners (the "Governing Body") of Montgomery County, Tennessee (the "County") to provide funds for the completion of said project; and

**WHEREAS,** it is the intention of the Governing Body to pay all costs of the completion of the said project by the sale of general obligation bonds (the "Bonds") or other debt obligations of the County; and

**WHEREAS**, it is anticipated that it will be necessary to make expenditures in payment of costs of completion of the project prior to the issuance of the Bonds or other debt obligations of the County; and

**WHEREAS,** the Governing Body wishes to state its intentions with respect to reimbursements for said expenditures in accordance with the requirements of final regulations applicable thereto promulgated by the United States Department of the Treasury.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Board of County Commissioners of Montgomery County, Tennessee, as follows:

**Section 1.** It is reasonably expected that the County will reimburse itself for certain expenditures in an approximate amount of \$2,200,000, made by the County in connection with the project. The County intends to reimburse all such expenditures through issuance of the Bonds or other debt obligations of the County. The expenditures made prior to the issuance of the Bonds or other debt obligations of the County are expected to be paid from the County's

Debt Service Fund and reimbursement shall be made to said fund. Debt service on the Bonds or other debt obligations issued for the purposes herein is expected to be paid from unlimited ad valorem taxes to be levied on all taxable property within the County.

- **Section 2.** The approximate principal amount of the Bonds, or other debt obligations of the County, are expected to be issued to finance the Project is \$2,200,000.
- **Section 3.** This resolution shall be placed in the minutes of the Governing Body and shall be made available for inspection by the general public at the office of the County Clerk.
- **Section 4.** It is the County's reasonable expectation that it will reimburse the original expenditures for the project, or a portion thereof, from the proceeds of the Bonds or other debt obligations of the County.
- **Section 5.** This resolution constitutes a declaration of official intent under Treas. Reg. §1.150-2.
- **Section 6.** All resolutions or parts of resolutions in conflict herewith are hereby repealed, and this resolution shall be in immediate effect from and after its adoption.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF INTERFUND CAPITAL OUTLAY NOTES, IN THE AGGREGATE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF NOT TO EXCEED TWO MILLION TWO HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$2,200,000) OF MONTGOMERY COUNTY, TENNESSEE; MAKING PROVISION FOR THE ISSUANCE, SALE AND PAYMENT OF SAID NOTES; ESTABLISHING THE TERMS THEREOF AND THE DISPOSITION OF PROCEEDS THEREFROM; PROVIDING FOR THE LEVY OF TAXES FOR THE PAYMENT OF PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON THE NOTES; AND PROVIDING FOR REIMBURSEMENT FROM TAX-EXEMPT OBLIGATIONS

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners (the "Governing Body") of Montgomery County, Tennessee (the "County") desires to provide funds for the (i) construction, renovation, repair, maintenance and equipping of the Civitan Park; (ii) payment of legal, fiscal, administrative, architectural and engineering costs incident to any or all of the foregoing; (iii) acquisition of all property, real or personal, appurtenant to the foregoing (collectively, the "Projects"); and (iv) reimbursement to the appropriate fund of the County for prior expenditures for the foregoing costs, if applicable; and

WHEREAS, under the provisions of Parts I, IV, and VI of Title 9, Chapter 21, Tennessee Code Annotated, as amended, local governments in Tennessee are authorized to finance the costs of the Projects through the issuance and sale of interest bearing interfund capital outlay notes with a maturity of up to three years upon the approval of the Director of State and Local Finance; and

WHEREAS, the Governing Body finds that it is advantageous to the County to authorize the issuance of interfund capital outlay notes to finance the costs of the Projects and reimbursement from federally tax-exempt obligations;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Governing Body of Montgomery County, Tennessee, as follows:

Section 1. For the purpose of providing funds to finance the costs of the Projects, the County Mayor of the County is hereby authorized to issue interfund capital outlay notes (the "Notes") in accordance with Sections 9-21-208 and 9-21-604, Tennessee Code Annotated, as amended, in a principal amount not to exceed two million two hundred thousand dollars (\$2,200,000). The Notes shall be issued on behalf of the County's General Capital Projects Fund. The Notes shall be purchased with monies in the County's General Debt Service Fund. The Notes shall be designated "Interfund Capital Outlay Notes", or such other designation as shall be determined by the County Mayor; shall be numbered serially from 1 upwards; shall be dated as of the date of issuance; may be issued in multiple emissions; shall be in denomination(s) as shall be determined by the County Mayor; shall be issued at not less than 100% of par value and accrued interest; shall bear interest at a rate agreed upon between the County Mayor and County Trustee, including a rate of 0%; and may have such other terms as may be permitted by applicable law.

Section 2. The Notes shall mature not later than three (3) years after the date of issuance, payable annually in the amount of 1/9<sup>th</sup> of the principal amount thereof with the balance payable at maturity, unless a waiver of periodic retirement is granted by the Director of State and Local Finance. Any extension or renewal notes shall not exceed the reasonably expected economic life of the Projects, which is hereby certified by the Governing Body to be equal to or greater than the final maturity of the notes authorized herein and any extensions thereof.

Section 3. The Notes, or any emission thereof, shall be subject to redemption, in whole or in part, at any time, at the principal amount thereof and accrued interest thereon to the date of redemption, without a premium.

Section 4. The Notes shall be repaid to the General Debt Service Fund from the General Capital Projects Fund with the proceeds of general obligation bonds anticipated to be issued by the County. The Notes shall be payable from unlimited ad valorem taxes to be levied on all taxable property within the County. The full faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the prompt payment of principal of and interest on the Notes. The tax herein provided may be reduced to the extent of any appropriations from the funds described above to the payment of debt service requirements of the Notes.

Section 5. The Notes shall be executed in the name of the County and bear the manual signature of the County Mayor of the County and the manual signature of the County Clerk with the County seal affixed thereon; and shall be payable as to principal and interest at the office of the County Trustee of the County or any such paying agent duly appointed by the County Mayor of the County. Proceeds from the sale of the Notes shall be deposited in the General Capital Projects Fund and used for the purposes described in Section 1.

<u>Section 6.</u> The Notes shall be in substantially the form attached hereto.

<u>Section 7.</u> The Notes shall not be issued until receipt of the Director of State and Local Finance's written approval for the issuance of the Notes.

Section 8. It is reasonably expected that the County will reimburse itself for certain expenditures made by it in connection with the Projects by issuing tax-exempt bonds. The expenditures will be made from the General Capital Projects Fund with the proceeds of the Notes, and reimbursement will be made to the General Capital Projects Fund and, in turn, the General Debt Service Fund. This resolution shall be placed in the minutes of the Governing Body and shall be made available for inspection by the general public at the office of the Governing Body. This resolution constitutes a declaration of official intent under Treas. Reg. §1.150-2.

Section 9. All orders or resolutions in conflict with this Resolution are hereby repealed insofar as such conflict exists and this Resolution shall be come effective immediately upon its passage.
