TENNESSEE SUICIDE PREVENTION NETWORK Trainings and Presentations

The Tennessee Suicide Prevention Network (TSPN) works to eliminate the stigma of suicide, educate the community about the warning signs of suicide, and ultimately reduce the rate of suicide in the state of Tennessee.

Note: length of training sessions may vary according to your needs.

"Question, Persuade, and Refer" (QPR)

(1-2 hours) This evidence-based training course teaches individuals how to recognize the warning signs of suicide, offer hope to people in crisis, and get help to save a life. It is suitable for people with little to no mental health background. Customizable for groups such as: Veterans, Elderly, Bullying, etc.

Alcohol and Drug QPR (A&D)

(1.5-2 hours) A customized version of QPR focused on the role substance abuse plays in suicides.

Lesbian Gay Bisexual Transgender (LGBTQ)

(Times Vary) A customized Suicide Prevention training regarding suicide risk within the LGBTQ community.

Assessing and Managing Suicide Risk (AMSR)

(1 day) Designed for and by mental health professionals to improve suicide risk assessment, treatment planning, and case management for clients at risk for suicide.

Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training (ASIST)

(2 day, 15 hours) Intensive suicide first-aid training for mental health professionals, using an evidence-based suicide intervention model to identify persons with thoughts of suicide, seek a shared understanding of reasons for dying and living, develop a safety plan, and prepare for follow-up.

TIP 50: Addressing Suicidal Thoughts and Behaviors in Substance Abuse Treatment

(1.5 hours) Presents guidelines for substance abuse treatment professionals working with clients who demonstrate suicidal ideation and behavior.

Suicide Prevention (SP)

(1 hour) General presentation covering basic prevention and warning signs of suicide.

Postvention Training

(Times Vary) Training on how to coordinate a comprehensive and safe response to a suicide affecting a business, school, or organization, with suggestions of how to talk to persons bereaved by suicide loss to promote their healing and identification of community resources.

Suicide to Hope (s2H)

(1 day) A workshop designed to help clinicians and mental health professionals promote recovery and growth for persons recently at risk of and currently safe from suicide.

Youth Mental Health First Aid (YMHFA)

(1 day/8 hours or 2 days/4 hours) Designed to teach people who work with youth ages 12-18 experiencing a mental health or substance abuse crises. The course introduces common mental health challenges for youth, reviews typical adolescent development, and teaches a 5-step action plan for how to help young people in both crisis and non-crisis situations.

safeTALK

(3 hours) Alertness training that prepares anyone over the age of 15, regardless of prior experience or training, to become a suicide-alert helper. safeTALK-trained helpers can recognize invitations and take action by connecting them with life-saving intervention resources, such as caregivers trained in ASIST.

Hi my name is Sheila Thaxton and this is my family. We all live in the county. We are here to propose a Montgomery County state ordinance on the discharge of firearms in certain areas unlawful. We would like to propose one the same as Richland County which states:

(a) Within three hundred yards of the property boundaries of any dwelling, business, or subdivision. It shall be unlawful for any person in the unincorporated area of the county to discharge any rifle, gun, pistol, revolver, or other similar instrument from or by means of which any bullet, shot, or other missile of any kind may be projected within three hundred yards of any building used as a dwelling or business, or within the boundaries of any subdivision or within three hundred yards of any subdivision......and so on

We want it to be clear that we support the NRA and are by no means against people owning guns. We just want to make sure they are shooting in a designated facility for such sport like a gun range.

As I read this to you there is a 2 year old child fighting for her life in Johnson City due to a stray bullet hitting her in the head while she was playing in her front yard.

We strongly feel putting the same state ordinance law into effect in Tennessee as the Richland County states can and will keep any other child or person from being victimized by a careless reckless shot fired from a gun just for sport in an uncontained area.

We have a letter stating our experience of such incidents with our plot of land which adjoins our neighbors.

We are desperately pleading for this law to be put into place due to our fear of becoming a victim of such a tragedy as the little girl in Johnson City. We sincerely hope you will take into account how the county is not country anymore due to smaller acreage being sold and closer developmental housing taking place.

We thank you for listening to our plea and we will be glad to answer any and all questions you may have.

To all State County Representatives

I am Sheila Thaxton. I live at 2753 Jarrell Ridge Road. We have 77 acres which my daughter and her husband also reside. They have 2 children our grandchildren ages 5 and 1 year old. At the moment they live in a mobile home on our 77 acres and have plans to build a home in 2020. My husband and I plan to deed them off 20 acres so they can.

For the past several years we have been dealing with a serious and dangerous issue. Our land bottle necks and there are three 5 acre plots in front of and connected to our 77 acres. The residents have set up targets to shoot their high power guns.

In the beginning the direct neighbor (Mark Farmer) was shooting rapid fire in a gully filled with lime stone rock and as the bullets where ricocheting off the limestone gully, we could hear them whiz past our heads. Of course it was sending our horses in a running panic. We were in fear of our life and our animal's lives so we called the Sheriff to please come out and stop this crazy dangerous act. When the Sheriff arrived to our surprise they claimed they could not do anything to stop them unless something was damaged or killed. This shooting went on every weekend for months. I reported it over and over and my fear turned to anger because to me it is crazy that something drastic has to happen in order for something to be done.

Now we have a Military family (Joshua Waters) which moved in house directly beside Mark. Mark and he have buddied up and their targets are now set up directly toward us. The last time my husband went over to see where he (Mr. Waters) was shooting and to try and reason with him he attacked my husband verbally saying "You think you own all this land". My husband informed him he did not but he did own the land he was shooting at where our adult children, grandchildren and our home reside. My son in law walked over to try and reason with him as well and noticed he was not only shooting but he was drinking alcohol (beer) while he was shooting. This upset Dewight (son in law) and he tried to get Mr. Waters to understand by saying what if it was your kids because we know he has young children. After leaving Mr. Waters continued to taunt them as they were working on a fence mockingly saying "Oh no my horses are scared". We are concerned about our horses going into a stress founder due to the gunfire but our main concern is our life especially the children which cannot even play outside due to the fear of being shot.

We have got an investigator trying to see if there is a state ordinance because the fact is the county is not country anymore. People are not buying large enough acreage to be shooting so freely. And our neighbors in front of us may have 5 acres but due to their house built in the middle of their 5 acres means they are shooting within the range of houses only an acre or 2 at tops between where they stand and shoot.

Although these are only a couple of incidents mentioned this has been years of torment with these neighbors.

We are not a family against guns and we DO support the NRA. We feel guns do not kill people, people kill people. If you are shooting irresponsibly and your bullet kills someone it is the person with the gun shooting who is at fault not the gun. In all actuality if we wanted, we too could set up a target and shoot right back at them due to the fact there is not a state ordinance stating otherwise but we would not dare put someone's life in danger as they are ours.

As I am typing this letter the news comes on and is reporting of a stray bullet hitting a 2 year old toddler in the head while playing in her yard. These reports of guns being used irresponsibly are continuous. I really do not want my family to be a victim of such tragedy. This is why we are determined to do everything in our power to stop this irresponsible sport that should be and can be done at a facility for such sport....GUN RANGE!

God forbid something happen especially something as drastic as a death. I shudder to think how emotions would run due to the fact we have tried desperately to have something done legally but totally in vain.

These are the resources we have exhausted. We were finally advised to turn to all state representatives because this is a state issue. I am in great hopes you will be our answer to resolving this once and for all.

- Sheriff- multiple reports. The last Sheriff that came out 3/10/19 finally admitted these neighbors were not shooting in a safe zone considering the fact they were directed toward our resident and land. The fact is no matter which direction they turn they will be shooting in the direction of someone's home / property. That is how their plot of land is laid out.
- 2. Game Warden which informed us it was out of his jurisdiction.
- 3. Detective Bryan DeRose which was investigating another similar issue in Woodlawn and said this was becoming a huge problem due to the fact that people are buying smaller acreage in the county. Mr. DeRose said he is trying to get together enough information to get the law changed because it is becoming a danger and the time has come to rethink the laws for the county. (I myself think one family's life in danger is enough) He told us to try and get as much evidence as possible via video etc...
- 4. Jim Durrett sent us to our county commissioner
- 5. Joe Smith who has done research to see who would be the correct person for our issue. He has emailed our Chief of Sheriff John Fuson.
- 6. John Fuson has not responded back to us.
- 7. Jessie Reynolds had a meeting with us 3/19/19 to evaluate our situation. He sees and agrees completely as to how unsafe not only for us but for our livestock (horses). Our land that our horses pasture on is an "L" shape surrounding the neighbors. Mr. Jessie and his partner stated how they wish they could do something more but since there is no law against this reckless sport their hands were tied. They did direct us in the direction of contacting any and all representatives to hopefully put a state ordinance stating the importance of shooting in a safe area/ distance from any and all dwellings. Preferably a gun range made for such a sport.

Representatives, I kindly ask you to please take this as a serious matter and not sit it aside. It is a shame for them as well as us how our land has connected but to endanger people's lives for this sport of theirs is inexcusable especially when there are designated safe places for this sport.

We love outdoor cookouts and activities. We want to ride our horses on a beautiful Sunday afternoon. It is nerve racking to try and do so when your horses are so upset due to the gunfire and bullets flying around not knowing where they will land. We respect our hunters during hunting season and do not ride the land around us during the season so there will not be any tragic accidents.

I respectfully beg you to help us stop this before something / someone is actually damaged, injured or killed.

Richland County Code of Ordinances Chapter 18. Offenses*

§ 18-1. Discharge of firearms in certain areas unlawful.

•

Latest version.

- (a) Within two hundred yards of the property boundaries of any school. It shall be unlawful for any person in the unincorporated area of the county to discharge any rifle, gun, pistol, revolver, or other similar instrument from or by means of which any bullet, shot, or other missile of any kind may be projected within two hundred (200) yards of the property boundaries of any school. This subsection shall not apply to the lawful defense of life or property.
 - (b) Within three hundred yards of the property boundaries of any dwelling, business, or subdivision. It shall be unlawful for any person in the unincorporated area of the county to discharge any rifle, gun, pistol, revolver, or other similar instrument from or by means of which any bullet, shot, or other missile of any kind may be projected within three hundred (300) yards of any building used as a dwelling or business, or within the boundaries of any subdivision or within three hundred (300) yards of any subdivision, as that term is defined in Sec. 26-22 of this Code. This subsection shall not apply to a peace officer or member of the armed forces of the United States or any authorized gun club, or in the lawful defense of life or property. This subsection also shall not apply to other lawful use of firearms by persons while upon their own property, nor shall this subsection apply to existing firearms ranges, lawful events or persons otherwise lawfully discharging firearms on another person's property with the landowner's express permission.
 - (c) *Penalty*. Any person convicted of violating this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of § <u>1-8</u> of this code.





With hopes that more people will accept the ideas being presented in this document here are brief quotes from my summary and quotes from the Leaf Chronicle article that prove my idea is very similar to what the school system is utilizing now (and needs to be implemented nationally)

(1) In my summary I wrote these two paragraphs:

"American astrophysicist and author Neil Tyson said: "Humans aren't as good as we should be in our capacity to empathize with feelings and thoughts of others, be they humans or other animals on Earth. So maybe part of our formal education should be training in empathy."

"That's a spectacular idea !!!! We believe lessons that encourage empathy for all living beings can be designed to greatly increase understanding and empathy for animals and also provide improvements in how people treat each other! Empathy lessons also have the potential of helping solve very serious human problems such as (A) attacks that are causing mass casualties in our schools and (B) preventing bullying!"

(2) On February 24th 2019 the Clarksville Leaf-Chronicle wrote that "the Clarksville Montgomery County School System decided to institute a new program this school year putting a focus on social emotional learning." "We realize we've got to do something to help kids who are struggling with emotional needs said Mary Gist director of middle schools for CMCSS. She said the need became apparent when they conducted focus groups finding the topic came up in every group." (end of quote)

The article began by saying more than 3,000 students attempt suicide every day in the United States in school shootings were at an all-time high in 2018.

I hope you can see the similarity in what I suggested 19 months ago and what the Leaf Chronicle published from the school system five weeks ago. The reason I'm pointing this out is the fact that many people don't readily accept ideas from

people who are not a well-known person or elected official or part of a group they are familiar with.

Empathy classes need to be comprehensive and not just taught occasionally.

I created a Facebook page titled Videos of Animals Saving Other Species Shows Their Great Love. These videos and my experience in rescuing feral cats have taught me that humans including me don't adequately understand that all animals have much more love and compassion and depth of spirit than most humans realize.

When you search "people don't like change" on Google you'll see they have three billion articles. Here's an article quote:

"Thinking about trying to shake things up at work? Brimming with new ideas and strategies? Hoping to get your organization to try a new way of doing things, or maybe just get your family to alter their holiday traditions a bit? Good for you. But if you are going to be an advocate for change, it might help you to start by understanding what you are up against, psychologically speaking."

"It's not just that people fear change, though they undoubtedly do. It's also that they genuinely believe (often on an unconscious level) that when you've been doing something a particular way for some time, it *must* be a good way to do things. And the *longer* you've been doing it that way, the better it is.

So change isn't simply about embracing something unknown -- it's about giving up something *old* (and therefore good) for something *new* (and therefore not good)."

When I represented Disney Movies I received an award I won for my ability to analyze, problem solve and create. My managers told me they used one of my ideas to make changes in the design of their 3D color character displays seen in Walmart's and Kmart's nationwide.

I have no training in management, analyzing or writing, I believe God works in broken flawed people like me. That way everyone knows any good works are coming from God and he gets 100 percent of the thanksgiving and appreciation. We thank You Lord!!!!

I hope and pray we all join together and find solutions to prevent bullying and suicides and violence in our society!

RESOLUTION TO ACCEPT OFFICE OF DOMESTIC PREPAREDNESS STATE HOMELAND SECURITY GRANT PROGRAM 34101-13319 AND TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS

WHEREAS, the Montgomery County Emergency Management Agency was awarded a grant from the Department of Military, Tennessee Emergency Management Agency, in the amount of one hundred thirty thousand, three hundred twelve dollars, and ninety-six cents (\$130,312.96), which includes:

- 1. Sixty-one thousand dollars (\$61,000.00) for upgrades to Montgomery County Bomb Squad F6A Robot; and
- 2. Eleven thousand, one hundred ninety four dollars, twenty five cents (\$11,194.25) for Crisis Negotiation training for District 7 law enforcement tactical teams; and
- Fourteen thousand, one hundred fifty-four dollars, sixty-eight cents (\$14,154.68) to purchase ballistic protection for firefighters with Montgomery County Volunteer Fire Service and Clarksville Fire Rescue; and
- Fourteen thousand, one hundred fifty-four dollars, sixty-seven cents (\$14,154.67) for Cheatham County to purchase ballistic protection and portable radios; and
- Thirteen thousand, one hundred fifty-four dollars, sixty-eight cents (\$13,154.68) to purchase Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) equipment and One thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for USAR training for Robertson County; and
- 6. Fourteen thousand, one hundred fifty-four dollars, sixty-eight cents (\$14,154.68) to purchase a UTV for Search and Rescue for Houston County; and
- 7. One thousand, five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) to purchase equipment and supplies for the Montgomery County Emergency Response Team (CERT) to continue training our citizens to prepare for, survive, and to assist others during and immediately following an emergency or disaster; and

RESOLUTION REAFFIRMING AND RE-ESTABLISHING SOLID WASTE FLOW CONTROL PURSUANT TO TENNESSEE CODE ANNOTATED §§ 68-211-814(b) AND 906(b) DIRECTING DELIVERY OF ALL SOLID WASTE GENERATED WITHIN THE UNINCORPORATED AREAS OF MONTGOMERY COUNTY, TENNESSEE STEWART COUNTY, TENNESSEE, THE CITY OF CLARKSVILLE, TENNESSEE AND THE CITY OF DOVER, TENNESSEE TO THE LANDFILL LOCATED IN MONTGOMERY COUNTY OPERATED BY BI-COUNTY SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

WHEREAS, Montgomery County is part of the Solid Waste Region formed by Montgomery County, Stewart County and Robertson County pursuant to Tennessee Code Annotated §§ 68-211-801 et seq. (SMR Planning Region), and Tennessee Code Annotated § 68-211-814(b)(1)(A) authorizes the region to regulate the flow of collected municipal solid waste generated within the region by resolution and subsequent adoption of ordinances by the counties and municipalities in the region; and

WHEREAS, Montgomery County and Stewart County authorized and entered into that certain Inter-Local Agreement dated July 11, 1994, as amended and restated, wherein the counties jointly formed the Bi-County Solid Waste Management System (Bi-County) as a solid waste authority under Tennessee Code Annotated § 68-211-901 et seq.; and Tennessee Code Annotated § 68-211-906(b) authorizes a solid waste authority, with the concurrence of the county governing body in any county for the territory outside of municipal boundaries, and the governing body of any municipality for the territory of the municipality, to exercise exclusive jurisdiction and exclusive right to control the collection of solid waste within its boundaries, and to control the disposition of solid waste collected within its boundaries; and in various actions of the county, including a resolution passed May 17, 2010, Montgomery County has concurred with Bi-County's jurisdiction and right to regulate the flow of all municipal waste within the counties constituting the authority and require the disposal of any transported waste to a specific disposal facility; and

WHEREAS, the county wishes to reaffirm the formation of the SMR Planning Region, Bi-County's formation as a Solid Waste Authority under Part 9 of the state solid waste laws, and the exercise of flow control to direct municipal solid waste generated within the County's boundaries to the public landfill in Montgomery County operated by Bi-County, located at 3212 Dover Road, Woodlawn, Tennessee, and known as the Bi-County Landfill, as these actions are deemed by this legislative body to be in the material best interest of its constituent citizens and are in furtherance of this body's obligations to the County's citizens to provide for the management and disposition of solid waste generated within its boundaries.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Montgomery County Board of Commissioners in Regular Session on this 8th day of April, 2019, that:

- 1. Montgomery County reaffirms the formation of, and its participation in, the SMR Planning Region.
- 2. Pursuant to Tennessee Code Annotated §68-211-814(b), the SMR Planning Region may regulate the flow of collected municipal solid waste generated within the unincorporated areas of Montgomery County.
- 3. Pursuant to Tennessee Code Annotated §68-211-814(b) and §68-211-906(b), Bi-County may regulate the flow of collected municipal solid waste generated within the unincorporated areas of Montgomery County.
- 4. Montgomery County hereby re-affirms the creation and establishment of Bi-County Solid Waste Management System as a solid waste authority pursuant to Tennessee Code Annotated § 68-211-903 pursuant to the 1994 Interlocal Agreement dated July 11, 1994 between Montgomery County, Tennessee and Stewart County, Tennessee, as amended and restated by the Inter-Local Agreement dated May 12, 2014 and the Inter-Local Agreement dated October 10, 2016, both amendments between Montgomery County, Tennessee and Stewart County, Tennessee.
- 5. Bi-County may regulate the flow of all municipal solid waste within the county and require the disposal of any transported waste at the Bi-County Landfill.

If any section, provision or part of this resolution shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall not affect the validity hereof as a whole or any section, provision or part thereof, not adjudged invalid or unconstitutional. Montgomery County intends that this resolution shall satisfy all actions needed from the County, including without limitation the procedural promulgation and concurrence requirements, to fully implement and give effect to the flow control powers provided under Tennessee Code Annotated §68-211-814(b) and §68-211-906(b). This resolution shall be in effect from and after its final passage approval and publication as provided by law.

RESOLUTION TO URGE THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY TO ADOPT AN EQUITABLE DISTRIBUTION OF LOCAL SALES TAX REVENUE FROM OUT-OF-STATE SELLERS

WHEREAS, county governments in Tennessee are the primary providers of numerous essential government services including, but not limited to, public K-12 education, jails and law enforcement, road building and maintenance, election administration, property assessment, solid waste disposal, and record keeping and administration for the various state courts; and

WHEREAS, county governments are limited by law regarding the forms of taxation and revenue generation which they are authorized to use, making the local sales tax an important source of revenue for counties; and

WHEREAS, the House Finance, Ways, and Means Committee asked the Tennessee Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations (TACIR) to study revenue sources of cities and counties in Tennessee and the services each provide; and

WHEREAS, representatives of counties and cities on the TACIR working group agree that the current distribution of the uniform local sales tax rate for out-of-state sellers is inequitable and should be eliminated; and

WHEREAS, the TACIR working group recommends that local sales tax revenue from out-of-state sellers be distributed based on the destination of the purchaser.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Montgomery County Board of Commissioners, meeting in regular session on this the 8th day of April, 2019, that members of the General Assembly representing the people of Montgomery County are strongly urged to work for the passage of legislation to provide for an equitable distribution of local sales tax revenue from out-of-state sellers by distributing the tax based on the destination of the purchase; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the County Clerk shall mail certified copies of this resolution to the members of the Tennessee General Assembly representing the people of Montgomery County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Montgomery County Board of Commissioners assembled in regular session on this 8th day of April 2019 that the attached revised Rule VIII, *Rules of Procedures for Filling of Vacancies by the County Legislative Body*, is hereby approved.

RULE VIII

RULES OF PROCEDURE FOR THE FILLING OF VACANCIES BY THE COUNTY LEGISLATIVE BODY

- 1. In addition to any other statutory requirements, the County Clerk shall provide notice to every member of the county legislative body of the need to fill the office or vacancy.
- 2. The presiding officer of the county legislative body shall cause public notice to be given in a newspaper of general circulation in the county at least seven (7) days prior to the meeting of the body at which the office is to be filled, notifying the public of the vacancy or opening and specifying the office or offices to be filled at the meeting. The Presiding officer of the county legislative body will set the date for the Commission's vote to fill the office or vacancy and will set a deadline for any potential Nominee to submit proof of residency and a statement for distribution to the Commission members. Materials submitted after the deadline will not be distributed until immediately before the voting called for on the agenda is reached.
- 3. Registered voters of the county shall be allowed an opportunity to submit names to the county legislative body for consideration. Such names may be submitted in writing to the Presiding officer of the county legislative body prior to the meeting or may be submitted in person at the meeting.
- 4. In order for a name to be considered, a member of the county legislative body must subsequently nominate the person. Members of the county legislative body may also nominate a Nominee or Nominees to fill the office or vacancy without such name being submitted by a voter. All such nominations do not require a second. If the person nominated is not present at the meeting, the person making the nomination shall submit a signed statement from the Nominee that the Nominee is willing to serve in the position if appointed. All Nominees shall be required to accept their nomination before being considered for appointment by the county legislative body.
- 5. Should a member of the county legislative body accept a nomination for a position or vacancy to be filled by the county legislative body, the member shall be prohibited from voting on the appointment or any motions or resolutions relative to making the appointment until the position is filled. If a member of the county legislative body is subsequently appointed to the position such member shall immediately resign from the county legislative body upon accepting the appointment. If the member does not receive the appointment, the member shall not be required to resign and may continue the member's duties on the county legislative body upon the conclusion of the vote on the appointment.

- 6. After nominations cease, the county legislative body may discuss the nominations and may, at the discretion of the Presiding officer of the county legislative body, interview Nominees or allow Nominees the opportunity to address the county legislative body for a maximum of five (5) minutes. To insure fairness and equal time, no questions will be allowed.
- 7. Upon motion passed by the majority of the members, the vote to make the appointment may be postponed to a subsequent meeting, provided that adequate public notice of the meeting is given in the accordance with Title 8, Chapter 44 (Sunshine Law).
- 8. To receive appointment to a vacancy or office:
 - The Nominee must receive the votes of a majority of the members of the county legislative body eligible to vote on the appointment, i.e., one more than half of the voting assembly. In any subsequent vote by the body, when any Nominee receives a majority then he/she is appointed to fill the vacancy or office. Any Nominee may withdraw his/her name at any time during the voting process. The body will follow Robert's Rules of Order for the entire voting process.
 - In the case of multiple Nominees, and/or where no Nominee receives a majority of the vote in the initial vote, if necessary to reach a majority, there may be two additional rounds of voting. During these two rounds any Nominee who receives zero votes will be eliminated.
 - In any and all subsequent votes, any Nominee receiving zero votes in that round shall be eliminated.
 - If, after the third round of voting, no Nominee has received a majority of the vote, and there remain more than three Nominees, all remaining Nominees shall be eliminated save the top three places for the next vote. If a tie exists as to the top three, the Presiding officer of the county legislative body shall break the tie to decide the third Nominee.
 - If after the fourth vote, three Nominees remain eligible, no Nominee receiving a majority of the vote, then in such case, only the remaining top two vote places shall be considered on the next vote. If a tie exists as to the top two, the Presiding officer of the county legislative body shall break the tie to decide the second Nominee.
 - In this fifth round of voting, only two Nominees remain. If there is a tie, the Presiding officer of the county legislative body shall break the tie to create a majority, however, if the Presiding officer of the county legislative body is unable to break a tie to decide a majority, the Commission will continue voting for one additional round. If a majority vote is achieved the Nominee is

selected. If there is a tie, the Presiding officer of the county legislative body shall break the tie to create a majority, however, if the Presiding officer of the county legislative body is unable to break a tie to decide a majority, the floor shall be opened for discussion among members of the Commission. The discussion will continue until the question is called on the last vote containing two nominees.

• After discussion ceases, the body will vote on the remaining two nominees again. If there is a tie, the Presiding officer of the county legislative body shall break the tie to create a majority, however, if the Presiding officer of the county legislative body is unable to break a tie to decide a majority then there will be two more votes of the body. If no one receives a majority after these two rounds of voting on the final two Nominees, the body will defer the question to its next scheduled meeting to be addressed as an agenda item on "Old Business" with the two remaining Nominees only for up to three more rounds of votes. In the final three votes, if there is a tie, the Presiding officer of the county legislative body shall break the tie to create a majority, however, only if the vote of the Presiding officer of the county legislative body breaks the tie to decide a majority.

The Voting Process: The Montgomery County clerk and his/her designated personnel will conduct the distribution and collection of paper ballots for the vote of the body. The paper ballots will be distributed by the Montgomery County Clerk. The ballots will be collected by the Montgomery County Clerk. Once the ballots have been collected, the vote is final. All votes shall be placed on this pre-printed ballot and read aloud by the County Clerk upon receipt and openly charted for public inspection as read.

RESOLUTION TO AMEND THE ANIMAL CARE AND CONTROL COMMITTEE MEMBER MAKE-UP AND DANGEROUS DOG QUORUM REQUIREMENTS

WHEREAS, the Rules Committee, from time to time, studies the makeup and activity of committees and makes recommendation for amendment or modification thereof; and

WHEREAS, the committee exists, Animal Care and Control Committee, pursuant to Tennessee Code Annotated § 68-8-101 through 115 and pursuant to resolutions, including Resolution 99-11-7 and Resolution 15-7-6; and

WHEREAS, the committee membership includes the County Mayor as a non-voting member; and

WHEREAS, the Rules Committee is of the opinion that the Mayor and/or his designee should sit and appear at the Montgomery County Animal Care and Control Committee as a full voting member; and

WHEREAS, the Animal Care and Control Committee makes up the Dangerous Dog Appeal Board which hears all appeals of dangerous dog determinations; and

WHEREAS, the appeal process should be governed by a randomly selected panel of the voting members of the Animal Care and Control Committee.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Montgomery County Board of Commissioners assembled in regular session on this the 8th day of April, 2019, that all resolutions previous speaking hereto are amended, modified, or repealed to establish that the Animal Care and Control Committee membership shall remain the same except that the County Mayor and/or his/her designee shall be a voting member of the committee; and further that the Dangerous Dog Appeal Board shall be comprised of three randomly selected members of the Animal Care and Control Committee for review of dangerous dog determinations as found within the regulations established herein.

A duly appointed alternate(s) shall be sworn in the same manner as regular members, and any action taken by a duly appointed alternate shall be as effective as if taken by the unavailable individual; and

WHEREAS, the Assessor of Property requests the addition of two alternates from different sections of the county who are freeholders and taxpayers, nominated by the Nominating Committee with approval by the Board of Commissioners, be added to the current membership of the Equalization Board.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Montgomery County Board of Commissioners meeting in regular business session on this 8th day of April, 2019 that the membership portion of the Equalization Board write-up be revised to add an additional two alternate members, a copy of which is attached hereto.

EQUALIZATION BOARD

Authority: TCA 67-1-410 and 67-5-1401 et seq; and Resolution 19-4-12

<u>Purpose:</u> To exercise all authority and perform all duties provided for by statute, the rules and regulations of the State Board of Equalization, or other legal authority.

Membership: Five (5) members from different sections of the county who are freeholders and taxpayers, three of whom are nominated by the Nominating Committee with approval by the Montgomery County Board of Commissioners, and two nominated by the City Mayor with approval by the Clarksville City Council. Further, (2) two alternate members from different sections of the county who are freeholders and taxpayers who are nominated by the Nominating Committee with approval by the Montgomery County Board of Commissioners, shall be appointed for a (2) year terms, and the board of equalization chair may call upon an alternate to sit for a regular member who becomes unavailable for a particular hearing due to disqualification or other reason. A duly appointed alternate shall be sworn in the same manner as regular members, and any action taken by a duly appointed alternate shall be as effective as if taken by the unavailable individual.

<u>Terms:</u> Two (2) years, expiring in April of even years. No county-appointed member shall serve for more than four full two-year terms in succession.

Meetings: Beginning on the first day of June of each year and sitting in regular session thereafter as necessity may require until the equalization has been completed. The board may not sit longer than the number of days fixed by the Montgomery County Board of Commissioners, and in no event longer than thirty (30) days; provided, however, the County Mayor may, when the Board of Commissioners cannot act, extend the time or may call the board into special session at any time if in his judgment the public welfare shall require it.

Compensation: Chairman, \$45.00 per day; the other four members, \$40.00 per day.
